Membership Advantages. These include an expanded voice with our County government, a forum for discussion of actions in response to unwanted activities on Banner Mountain, a connection with other organizations in the area, such as the FireSafe Council and SOHC (Save Our Historic Canals). In addition, several local business offer discounts to BMHA members (details below).

2013 Focus – FireWise and Property Security. Practical recommendations on how to reduce the potential of a large wildfire or a localized home fire will be provided at the Spring meeting. This year the issue of property security will emphasized in response to an increasing number of home burglaries on Banner Mountain.

Important Dates: This year Scotch Broom Day is April 20. Scotch Broom is a serious fire hazard, particularly along fire evacuation routes (See the BMHA website.) Come help on April 20 (9:00 to 12:00) to remove this plant along Banner Lava Cap and Gracie roads. The Annual Spring meeting focusing on FireWise and Property Security is June 1 (10:30 to 12:30) at Seaman's Lodge in Pioneer Park, Nevada City.

SECURITY ON THE MOUNTAIN

Crime and vandalism have been increasing on Banner Mountain. Security breaches have been noted on several areas of Banner Mountain. Beginning in the Spring of 2012 and throughout the summer months, burglaries, unfamiliar vehicles and people have been seen in the areas of Banner-Quaker Cross, Altair, Lava Cap Mine, and Banner Lava Cap Roads and others. At least two different black Honda sedans were identified and linked to home burglaries or attempted break-ins. One culprit even wore a camouflaged, leaf-like ghillie suit and looked like a pile of leaves (see photo below)! An accomplice had a machete in the trunk of a black Honda sedan.

Other incidents have been related to drugs, drunkenness or vandalism by teenagers: "egging" homes, throwing rocks at satellite dishes, tampering with U.S. mailboxes,

Before the police arrived, his accomplice grabbed a backpack from his vehicle and ran off. He left behind a machete and a container full of marijuana. exploding 2-liter plastic bottle chemical bombs, etc. Another incident in early November 2012, was caused by two drunken 15-year-olds yelling to be let in and pounding on a neighbor's front door late at night. After the Sheriff arrived, the juveniles were found in the area and cited.

NEIGHBORHOOD WATCH PROGRAMS are one of the most effective means for keeping crime out of our neighborhoods. These rely on the best crime fighting tool: good, observant neighbors working in cooperation with the Sheriff's department

— neighbors looking out for each other! An excellent example of an effective neighborhood watch program on Banner Mountain was described to us by Kim West, Neighborhood Watch Captain, for the Butterfly Drive and Mayflower Drive area. Kim said their program has been operating successfully for 22 years! She and her neighbors worked with the Sheriff to establish their program. More details on this watch program and others on Banner Mountain will be described later on our website and in a future newsletter.

Don't forget: For a burglary or crime in progress, call 911 immediately.

FIREWISE: DIVISION CHIEF DAVID RAY

(con'd) Operationally, the Nevada County Consolidated Fire District has not changed. Due to your assistance (*Thank you very much!*) with the approval of the special tax last year, we are able to maintain our current level of response [our fire station is staying open]. Calling 911 for our assistance will continue to receive the high level of service that we are noted for throughout Nevada County.

Please be fire safe this winter. Watch out for the candles and combustibles near a heat source! Call 911 early, we can always turn around. Drive slowly in the ice and snow. Don't touch a downed line. It could be just the phone line or worse yet...a power line! You never know when the power will be re-energized or if someone is back feeding the power from a generator!
